What parents need to know about LIVE STREAMING

AGE RESTRICTIONS
Most live streaming services have age restrictions. For example, YouTube restricts live streaming to users aged 13 and over. However, some services allow users to stream content to a private group of friends, bypassing age restrictions.

WHAT IS BROADCASTING YOUR CHILD'S LIVE STREAMING?
Live streaming is a type of video sharing that allows you to broadcast a live video to a group of people. It's often used for gaming, vlogging, and social media. However, it can also be used to share inappropriate content, such as bullying or sexual abuse.

RECOGNISING YOUR CHILD'S LIVE STREAMING
Your child may tell you they are live streaming. However, they may also be live streaming without your knowledge. Look for signs such as a child being unusually excited or secretive about their online activities.

PROTECTING THEIR IDENTITY
Your child should never share their full name, address, or other personal information in a live stream. They should also avoid sharing their location or identifying themselves as being in a specific place.

REMOVE LINKS TO OTHER APPS
If your child has a live streaming account, they should not share links to other apps or social media accounts. This helps to protect their privacy and prevent them from being contacted by strangers.

BE PRESENT
If your child is live streaming, you should be present and monitor their activity. This helps to ensure they are safe and that they are not sharing inappropriate content.

PROTECT PERSONAL INFO
Your child should never share their personal information, such as their name, address, or phone number, in a live stream. They should also avoid sharing their location or identifying themselves as being in a specific place.

PRIVACY SETTINGS
Your child should check their privacy settings on any live streaming app they use. They should make sure that their content is only visible to their intended audience.

TALK REGULARLY WITH YOUR CHILD
Talk to your child about live streaming and the risks involved. Encourage them to think carefully about what they share and to report any concerns to you.


