Be SunSmart

Being SunSmart is about protecting skin and eyes from damaging UV radiation – especially when outdoors from September to April.



Slip on a shirt
Slip on a shirt with long sleeves. Fabrics with a tighter weave and darker colours will give you better protection from the sun.



Slip into the shade
Slip into the shade of an umbrella or a leafy tree. Plan your outdoor activities for early or later in the day when the sun's UV levels are lower.



Slap on sunscreen
Slap on plenty of broad spectrum sunscreen of at least SPF 30. Apply 20 minutes before going outside and reapply every two hours and especially after being in water or sweating.



Slap on a hat
Slap a wide brim hat or a cap with those. Make people sit without on the face and neck than any other part of the body.




Wrap on sunglasses
Choose close fitting, wrap around style sunglasses. Not all sunglasses protect against UV radiation, so always check the label for sun protection rating.





Woodpeckers

Woodpeckers have continued learning about fractions, counting on a number line using fractions, investigating what happens when a fraction is bigger than a whole and looking at tenths as fractions and what their equivalents as decimals are. In English, we have been learning an explanation text about volcanoes and using this to retrieve information, look at the vocabulary and plan our own explanation text based on different types of mountains. We have also been on a cross curricular Science and Geography walk up Coppett Hill, to find out about the local rocks and soils in our area and what the rocks tell us about what it was like in Goodrich millions of years ago. We were fascinated to find out that some of the rocks have been there for around 375 million years (a period known as the Devonian) and that Britain was once located fifteen degrees below the Equator!




