


We hope that the changes will not be needed after next week but will review this, early next week and let you all know.




Class News

There has been some brilliant dialogue using speech marks and some alternative words instead of 'said'. All the children have been working hard in maths, they have been working out division number sentences, reading word problems and looking at true or false statements. You can really see their confidence growing every day. Dance this week was focused upon emotion through being an animal, the children have been putting a sequence of movements together with different emotions. Another fantastic computing lesson using the iPads this week; the children learnt about portrait and landscape and played photo bingo where they had to photograph something red or a person. I think there are some budding photographers! In RE the children have been learning about the Gospels and have been thinking about the moral of the Good Samaritan.
