 Pretty strangers can be as dangerous as scary-looking strangers.

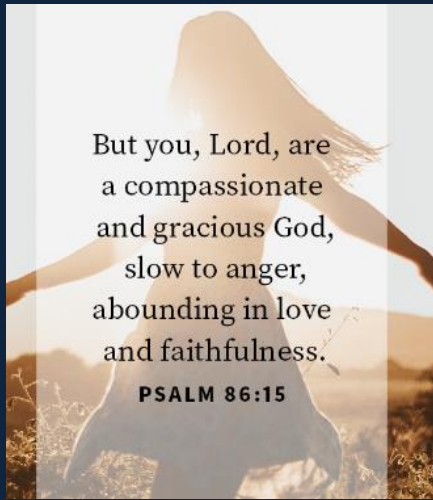
02 Who can they go to when they need help?

04 What to teach your child:
 Always be accompanied by someone they can trust.
 Know the home address and mummy's and daddy's phone numbers.
 Screen or shout "NO" when they are in a dangerous situation.
 Talk with mummy/daddy about their day and not keep secrets from them.



Robins	<p>We kicked off our first week back with PSHE activities based around the theme of keeping safe online. We read the story of 'clicking chicken' who crept into the farmers house without telling her mum and dad and used his computer to purchase lots of interesting things. When she got lonely, she went online to find a friend and was tricked by Mr Fox by pretending to be someone he was not. The children were able to highlight the mistakes that clicking chicken had made and talked about what she needed to do to stay safe. We created alternative story for clicking chicken so that she was safe on the internet. The children created posters to tell others what they need to do to stay safe. During our sessions we also discussed why we have age restrictions on TV, film and video games, the children were shocked to find out that games such as Roblox and Minecraft have a PEGI rating of 7+ and Fortnite has a rating of 12+.</p> <p>In Maths we have been thinking about symmetry and folding 2D shapes and creating mirror images. In History the children have learnt all about the printing press and how this invention changed the world. Woodpeckers	<p>To start Spring 2, we have had a PSHE focus all week about keeping safe. We started by looking at being safe at home and school, how to be safe when out and about and how to be 'fire safe' indoors and outdoors. We chose one of these areas to then make an informative poster about how to keep safe. Over in Forest School, we put our fire safety rules to the test and made a fire, before making s'mores and then learnt how to be safe when putting out a campfire and why it is important to make sure the fire is completely out.</p> <p>In Maths this week, we have been looking at recognising 2D shapes and finding the perimeter of different shapes by using addition, subtraction and even some multiplication. We also put our measuring skills to the test, to weigh ingredients to make Welsh cakes and even learnt some Welsh to commemorate St. David's Day! In PE, we have been learning attacking and defending skills through invasion games and have also started to compose a dance, inspired by a picture- 'Coming from the Mill' by L.S. Owls	<p>In Maths, we have been developing our understanding of short division and using it to solve problems. In Science, we learnt about the shape and relative size of the Earth to the sun and moon. We found out that if the Earth was the size of a pea, the moon would be about the size of a peppercorn and the sun would be a large beach ball! We also used a pea, peppercorn and beach ball to measure out the relative distance between the earth, sun and moon. In Computing we have been developing our video editing skills by planning a short film and thinking about the different filming techniques to make it interesting for the viewer. In PE we are continuing with our swimming lessons and developing our stroke technique and stamina in the water. On Friday we celebrated World Book Day and dressed up as a character from a book. During the day we enjoyed buddying up with Robins Class to read together and share our favourite books. Linking to World Book Day, we have been researching a favourite author, in English, and creating Top Trump cards of famous authors.
