This week has been SATs week for Year Six, a week that feels pressured for them and for the staff looking after them. Our children are, of course, so much more than a snapshot taken on one day based on English and Maths and we praise and recognise that in all we do with them at school. I do however not see them as wrong, they are something the children need to become used to as part of the next step in their academic journey. In secondary school they are regularly tested in this way to see where they are and what support they might need. So, whilst the rigidity of the system and formality is very different to how we normally do things, I think it is also another part of the experiences they should have before they leave us, in a place and with staff they know well.

Wrens	In Wrens, Reception have been learning 'We are Going on a Bear Hunt' with our own actions. In English, Year 1 have been editing our own version of 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt.'
