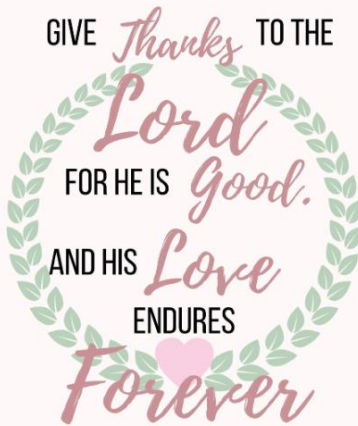

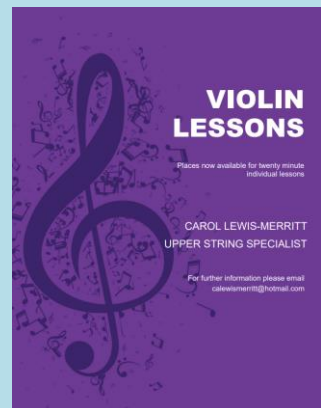

Dear all,

We come to the final newsletter of the year which is always the first time that I really start to comprehend that we will be saying goodbye to some of our precious children and staff. We start to look at the children's pictures from earlier in their Goodrich journeys and reminisce about events, achievements, and their personal growth too. It is always our hope that we let them go, knowing that we have done our very best to prepare them for life outside the Goodrich bubble and ready to contribute to a much larger community with their own moral compass and self-belief. We are saying goodbye to families who we have enjoyed fantastic relationships with. Some for several members of the same family who have been a pleasure to educate. Thank you for all that you have contributed in your time with us. As a staff we are blessed with individuals who add so much to our school community and believe passionately in our vision for the children. Just like the children, they each bring different skills, talents and life experiences for the children to benefit from and this adds to the richness of the children's school provision. ## Class News

Goldcrests

The children showed some great imagination during the week as they developed the train station, having tickets, they soon assembled a train by using chairs and between them discussed where they were going. Having some wonderful destinations from 'big school, the seaside, Legoland and Disneyland Paris.' At times it was a bit of a shaky journey and the engineers had to investigate why it had broken down. A bit of a worry when they began to use hammers as well as screwdrivers from the tool kits.

There was a lot of splashing and creating waves as they explored the fruit tea in the water tray, infusing the smell as they poured it from jugs to test tubes. Construction was a big part of the play as the children created train tracks inside and out and using the tools and Meccano, created some amazing work, building people, vehicles and buildings. Finding a treasure chest in the pirate small world, brought a frenzy of excitement as we explored for treasure around Nursery, finding precious gems and stones. During Forest School the children had to try hard and be patient whilst they had to take turns in being the seeker in our game 1, 2, 3, where are you? Some children showed some great knowledge, counting up to thirty and beyond. There was great excitement as the rope swing had been put back in place and once again the children had to be patient and take turns waiting for their go.

This week at Forest School the children learnt a little more about fire safety and why we have buckets of water or sand ready in case we need to put the fire out. Helping to cook their snack of popcorn, holding it above the fire and watching as it began to pop and fill up the sieves. Exploring the letter sound 'e' this week, we have been linking elephants by size and colour, finding the small 'tiny' medium and large. Identifying which items float and sink in our water tray and highlighting it on our graph, as well as looking at capacity, saying when the container is full or empty. Noticing a nest of eggs in our shelter, on opening them we began to name the animals that start out life as eggs, being laid and hatched, discovering dinosaurs, birds, spiders and snakes. Our role-play has once again been a busy place as we look at the role of the post office, writing letters, envelopes, labels and forms to post in the post box. Having to concentrate on how to carefully put the cards and letters into the envelopes and learning that we need to put the names and addresses on the envelopes for the postman to be able to deliver them. We now await the postal worker to open the box to deliver the post.


Wrens

Woodpeckers	<p>In Woodpeckers Class, we have been finishing our work on fractions by adding and subtracting fractions and using our times table facts to help us find fractions of amounts and equivalent fractions. We have also been converting improper fractions into mixed numbers. In English, we have been working on our reading comprehension skills to retrieve and find information about the Stone Age and using this to help us make a non-chronological report on Stone Age life. We have also been using images from 'The Stone Age Boy' to help write descriptions of different settings. In History, we used Now Press Play to experience what life was like in Stone Age Britain between the Mesolithic and Neolithic periods and why cave paintings and Stonehenge were important to Stone Age people. In Science, we have been using Carroll diagrams and Venn diagrams to sort living things into different groups and discussing what different criteria they can be sorted by. We have also been creating our own classification keys to identify different vertebrates and invertebrates. In D.T., we worked together in groups, to use the different structures we have learnt to make a bridge for a toy car to get across and then tested out our structures. In Computing, we have been using Turtle Academy to create different shapes using codes and algorithms and on Monday, we were lucky enough to have our school pupils perform and play their musical instruments on stage, including Hayleigh who played her harp beautifully and played a variety of different songs. We would like to thank Mrs Wimperis for volunteering her time to listen to readers and to Mrs Dix and Mrs Green for teaching our class Art and DT on Tuesday afternoons and for all the support and dedication you have given Goodrich School over the years. We hope you enjoy your retirement! 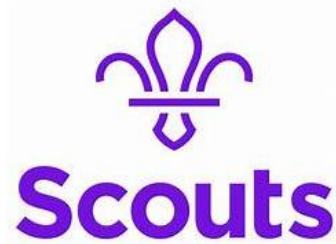
