

#### **Class News**

Last week we were looking at animals that hibernate, the children mentioned a bat, bear and hedgehog, and the reason why they needed to- because it is getting colder and food is scarce. At Forest School we made hedgehog homes for our toy hedgehogs and added sticks and leaves to the hibernacula for the real hedge to make it a cosier place. The children loved creating hedgehogs out of bread dough, learning the skill of kneading by squashing and folding, then creating a ball shape. They then added spines by practising our scissor skills to cut the dough. The children discovered that a tortoise also hibernates in winter through our story of 'Ridiculous' and how different he is compared to other animals, before returning home having to break the ice on the shed with his shell.

We have taken on character roles from Goldilocks and the Three Bears and explored porridge in our sensory tray. We have practised counting backwards, learning the rhyme 5 Little Speckled Frogs.

This week we have started to think of Harvest and what that means to us in readiness for the Harvest Festival, looking at the crops that grow locally such as sweetcorn in our sensory tray and potatoes in our maths activities. We have been counting them and seeing which is the heaviest or lightest using our balance scales.

The children had an amazing time at Forest School working together to build a Scarecrow for the Nursery Garden, which has been admired by many, learning how they protect the crops in the fields. We have also created scarecrow pictures using our knowledge of shapes and a scarecrow mask.

We used our bodies to pretend we are scarecrows as we learnt the song, 'Dingle, Dangle Scarecrow.' Listening to our story of the week 'Scarecrows Wedding,' learning how Betty O'Barley and Harry O'Hay prepared for their wedding. This led to the children dressing up in their party clothes and celebrating special occasions.

In Maths, the Reception children have been busy singing number songs, counting out the correct amounts and thinking about 'more'. The Year One's have been combining two groups together, using the + and = sign. In Science and linked to Harvest, we have been thinking about the parts of plants that we can eat; we had a variety of vegetables so the children could take a closer look and decide which parts we eat. In PSHE we have been thinking about what it means to be a good friend and how to be a good friend to each other. The children came up with lots of good ideas for example if someone falls over, go and help them and ask if they are okay. We have been learning some Harvest songs together for our harvest celebration.

We started the week off with our first House Event of the year – 'Capture the Flag!' Also how we can change nouns to pronouns to make a piece of writing more interesting. In Geography, we have been learning about 'Fair Trade' and in Computing, we have been looking at how network devices connect, how the World Wide Web is part of the internet and have been exploring different websites to see what content we can find, see, hear and do e.g. videos, quizzes and pictures. In Science, we have been sorting different animals by their skeletons and have been identifying different Leyla bones to make a human skeleton. This week in Maths, we have been solving problems involving rounding to the nearest ten, hundred and thousand. In English we have been presenting our autobiographical poems. In Art, we have been developing our space artwork and have produced some super work inspired by David A. Hardy (which you can see below.) Whilst in History, we have been learning about Anglo-Saxon kings and justifying what made King Alfred the Great so great! This week we have enjoyed lots of different activities. Then on Wednesday, most of Year 5 went on a residential to London with Year 6 and have enjoyed city life...with a river cruise, visit to the London Eye, museum visits, theatre visit and of course restaurant visits. Meanwhile, the rest of Owls Class have been busy designing and making maths board games, baking biscuits, looking after our school environment by doing some gardening and visiting Coppett Hill.
