

### **Class News**

This week started off with an amazing autumn walk to the churchyard, exploring the many trees and the colours the leaves are changing to 'red, orange, yellow and brown.' We collected some treasures to add to our autumnal sensory table, where we have used magnifying glasses to examine the veins on the leaves, the different sizes in conkers, beech nuts, acorns etc.. We have been practising our maths skills by, counting conkers, matching the numbered acorns to their shell and counting pumpkin seeds to correspond to the numbered pumpkins. Great fun was had using pumpkins in our play at first, we practised our mark making skills to decorate them, drawing faces and adding patterns, finally using them as a sensory experience, scooping out the insides.

Celebrating Harvest, the children enjoyed tractors big and small, learning how tractors harvest vegetables on the farm. Then replicating this in our sand pit, harvesting potatoes, shallots, turnips and in our corn sensory tray. Learning how corn is ground to make flour to bake bread, in our story 'The Little Red Hen,' looking at how her friends didn't want to help her to make bread but were happy to eat it. We have been mark making in flour having a go at writing our names. Roleplaying in the baker's shop, where we had a great time buying and selling bread ready for our picnics. The older children enjoyed

joining in with the school as we celebrated the Harvest Festival.

Last week Wrens class were busy preparing for our Harvest Festival at St Giles church. We carefully sketched various vegetables and then used pastels to add colour. In RE we thought about what harvest means and talked about things that we are thankful for. In English we have been finishing off our instructions for Jasper's beanstalk and we planted our own broad bean seeds following the Year 1 children's instruction writing which they completed in their English lesson. In Maths the Year 1's have been adding numbers to 20 using objects, number lines and part whole models. They have also been reading addition word problems. The reception children have been outside finding different amounts of objects and counting them. In Art we have been inspired by Andy Warhol and his pop art and we have created our own self-portraits in his style. In History we finished off our Great Fire of London theme with a NowPressPlay experience which the children really enjoyed. In PE we have been journeying through the jungle and the children have been jumping on and off lily pads, throwing and catching bananas (beanbags!) and travelling in various ways like different animals. It has been a busy and enjoyable start to the school year. I wish you a restful half term.

We had a great couple of weeks thinking about what Harvest time means to us. In Science we have been thinking about the parts of a plant that we eat. In English we read, 'Pumpkin Soup' by Helen Cooper. We wrote our own recipes and even made our own pumpkin soup. In Art we made fruit portraits inspired by the artist Giuseppe Arcimboldo. We also made observational paintings of fruit. In Maths we have been learning about related facts and number bonds to ten and one hundred. We have been using these skills to add and subtract. In History we finished our theme of the Great Fire of London with a QR code scavenger hunt. In PE we have been doing gymnastics and throwing and catching. In RE we have been reading the creation story and thinking about what we appreciate in the natural world. We wish you all a very happy and restful half-term break.

Woodpeckers have been very busy over the last two weeks. Last week, we were preparing for our harvest festival and looking at wheat harvest. We looked at how wheat is grown and harvested and how it is turned into flour. We then painted wheat field landscapes and used our painting techniques we have been learning in Art to help us create our own pictures, inspired by Vincent Van Gough. We also worked on our cooking and baking skills and followed recipes to make banana bread (which linked to our Geography work on Fair Trade and the journey of a banana) and bread rolls to see the difference in ingredients and how they are made differently. After they were baked, we ate them for a delicious snack and they were very yummy indeed!

This week, we have been comparing and ordering numbers, using the symbols for greater than, less than and equals to. We have also been using our number and place value knowledge to explain our reasoning. In English, we have been learning about imperative verbs (bossy verbs) and have been writing a set of instructions to explain how to make banana bread. We have also been working on our inference skills and making inferences about pictures and objects. In Science, we have been carrying out an investigation on whether people with longer femurs (thigh bones) can jump further and have been carrying out physical activities to find out which muscles we use around our body when we do different movements and exercises. In PE, we have been working on our dribbling, control and passing skills whilst using a hockey stick and in Computing, we have been exploring how media can be made and shown on different websites using Chrome Music Lab. In Music, we have been continuing to develop our skills on the ukulele and looking at different tempos and rhythms by listening and tapping to the music.


